






SUMMERTIME HEROS: A salute to our sisters in Saudi Arabia, who this summer finally were granted the right to drive.

Saudi Arabia, the only country in the world that forbade women from getting behind the wheel, announced that women will be allowed to obtain drivers licenses in June 2018.



The announcement that Saudi Arabia will finally allow women to drive has been hailed a watershed moment for gender equality, but the kingdom still has many laws in place that restrict the rights of women. Women cannot, without the consent of their male guardians: marry, divorce, receive custody of their own children, get a passport, travel abroad, leave jail, open a bank account, get a job, dress how they want, interact freely with men, receive equal inheritance or seek medical treatment.


