Putting Girls on a Path to a Brighter Future

After decades of providing support to disadvantaged women, we asked: How can we make an even bigger impact and reach women before they find themselves in crisis?

The answer, of course, is to invest in girls.

In order to break cycles of poverty, violence, and abuse, we must empower girls with the self-confidence and knowledge they need to achieve success in their careers and personal lives. And we must show them the pathway to realize their dreams.

A girl should be able to grow up to be anything she wants to be. But it is not enough to celebrate "girl power" without also providing examples of strength.

It is not enough to encourage young girls to dream big without direction or skills to make those dreams a reality.

Today's population of adolescent girls—600 million—is the largest in human history. But in spite of all the progress we've made toward gender equality, far too many girls—especially in disadvantaged communities—derail on the pathway to economic achievement and brighter futures. They are particularly vulnerable to teen dating violence, sex trafficking, and becoming moms while still in their teens.




After completing a rigorous research and development process, we launched *Dream It, Be It: Career Support for Girls.* The program targets girls in secondary school and provides them with access to professional role models, mentors, and career education. Although all girls face barriers because of their gender, we prioritize working with girls who have additional obstacles including poverty, unstable home lives, living in foster care, or teen motherhood.

The Dream It, Be It curriculum launched in January 2015, and already more than 8,000 girls in 432 communities around the world have participated.

Though we are still compiling data on the program's impact, we've heard from our Soroptimist volunteers that some of the older girls are already finding success in college and employment training programs. And last year, 90 percent of girls who participated said they now feel more confident about their future success.

We believe in the power of this program to move the needle. By reaching girls while they are still young, we not only can help them stay healthy and safe in the short term, but we can reduce the number of women in crisis in the future. The program's initial success fuels our determination to expand and help even more girls rise to great heights. Now that we've seen the results, we want to grow this program quickly so we can reach more of the girls who need our support.
