This past month has been chaotic. The holiday and the incredible amount of snow precluded Saundra from working with the kids much in February. But Sue Mac had lots of fun helping, and learning, with the kids.

Do you remember the difference between a metaphor and a simile? What is a composite number? Is there a difference between a hurricane, cyclone and typhoon? Can you name the symbols on the Montana State flag? Sometimes it's a challenge to work with 4th graders when you, yourself, can't remember or don't know what you're helping them with.

That last one stumped me. Our state flag: There's a sun, some mountains, water, trees, a pick and axe, and "oro y plata" but symbols? I'm out in the hall helping a 4th grade boy. He gets frustrated with me and walks into the classroom and announces that Miss Sue doesn't know the answer. Can the teacher come out to the hall help him? Yes, it can be embarrassing sometimes!

However, I do believe I'm a tad smarter from working with these kids. We teach each other.

One of my favorite students asked me why he had to learn all this math when grownups can't remember how to do it. My simple answer: "It comes back quickly when you need to use it <u>IF</u> you learned it once in the 4th grade.

That's true about a lot of the information you're learning. It's tucked away somewhere in your brain even if you think you've forgotten it. You can recall it faster when you knew it once. Otherwise you'll be stuck because you never knew". We had a great day working on his math together.

So here we go: No calculators allowed! Figure this one out: Lisa played golf for 2 days. On her first day she hit the ball 265 <u>yards</u>. On her second day she hit the ball 49 <u>feet</u> and at the end an additional 7 inches. How many <u>inches</u> total did she hit the ball in 2 days? OK, it's not difficult math but it's likely you'll make a mistake converting yards and feet to inches when you do it all by hand. But really, you have to ask yourself, who would ever calculate their golf game in inches? Both of us laughed at that.

March Hero



No list of women heroes would be complete without <u>Eleanor</u> Roosevelt. She was truly a champion of women rights, in America and across the world. In her own lifetime, she was recognized as the most famous woman in the world.

Through her impassioned advocacy for the rights of women, children, and downtrodden, she became America's social conscience. She played a major role in the 12-year presidency of her wheelchair bound husband by traveling the world as a factfinder, an ambassador and to bring women into government.

After Franklins death Eleanor became a delegate to the United Nations where she won world acclaim for her forceful sponsorship of the US Declaration of Human Rights, perhaps her crowning achievement.
